As a result, Nate would dutifully write out his message in longhand each month and deliver it for publication. Now as everyone who has ever read "Notes from Nate" knows, the column was never written in plain English, but Nate's own unique "Yinglish."

Of course, computer spellcheck does not know from "Yinglish," so I spent countless months, days and hours over the years "educating" my computer to understand Nate. It didn't help that the same word would be spelled a different way each month or that one of my many coeditors, would disagree as to the correct spelling and insist it be corrected.

Some said that Nate had a one-track mind when it came to his column.

In some ways, he did, but it was hardly just one track. Each month he delighted us with tales of his family, wife. his Andrea. and three daughters, Shari, Heather and Deborah; their husbands, David, Robbie and Dave. and his grandchildren, Kate, Justin, Owen, Benji and Abby.

You really could feel the love and often the sorrow emanating from his words.

In his final submission, this past April, he lamented that, "my only regret is that I will only get to spend a few more precious years with [my grandchildren]."

Unfortunately, Nate was not given the length of years to see his grandchildren grow. However, I am sure he will continue to live through the stories his family will pass down to the next generation.

If his family was his love, antique cars and Forestdale Heights Lodge was his passion. No matter what else was going on in his life, he loved to share tales from the Lodge's past.

It really was a different lodge, one in its infancy and comprised of young members who were starting families and businesses. Despite everything that was going on in their hectic lives, they found the time to lav the foundations for Forestdale Heights. His column this past January illustrated the times perfectly, as he took us back 35 years, recalling when the Lodge was awarded the rights to sell beer and food on Grey Cup Sunday. It was then that his infamous "Atomic Chili" was created.

Nate did not just live in the past when it came to the Lodge. He was passionate about the Lodge's present and future. He continually urged members to become active and to make their own mark on Forestdale Heights.

Nate was so many things, a loving husband, father, a zaidy and Lodge brother. Most of all, he was Nate, sometimes friend, occasional adversary, but always a true original. I could go on and on, but figured that, one last time, he should have the final word.

"So, my Forestdale brothers and sisters, hear me well. Each day is a gift. Love as if there is no tomorrow, overcome those things you can, and find a way to live with things you can't change. Do what you can to bring joy to those who matter to you and remember that they call today, the present, because it is a present that you can choose to enjoy."

HIGH HOLIDAY RECIPE

Honey Mustard Chicken

Prep Time: 10 minutes

Cook Time: 1 hour, 30 minutes

Total Time: 1 hour, 40 minutes

Ingredients:

- 4 pounds (2 kilograms) chicken pieces
- 2-4 Tbsp. canola oil or 1/4 cup melted margarine
- 1/2 cup honey
- 1/4 cup mustard •
- 1 tsp. curry •
- 1 clove garlic, minced •
- 1 tsp. salt

Preparation:

1. In a small bowl, mix together melted margarine, honey, mustard, curry, garlic and salt.

2. In a shallow baking pan, place chicken pieces skin-side down. Pour dressing over the chicken. Cover and marinate in the refrigerator for 2 hours.

3. Preheat oven to 350°F (180°C).

4. Place chicken in oven, covered, for 30 minutes.

5. Uncover the chicken and turn skin-side up. Baste.

6. Bake at 350°F (180°C) for an hour or until cooked through and browned. Baste once or twice during the hour.

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
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FORESTDALE FUNNIES

As I See It



We Jews are an optimistic people. We look to the past only as a means to guide our present and future. 5774 is around the corner. We don't yet know what the Almighty has in store. G-d knows we've had our

tsuriss, and no family remains untouched by sadness, death and hard times. Somehow, we manage to get through the difficult

situations and persevere.

Rosh Hashanah, and indeed the High Holy Days, is a time of reflection and introspection.

We aim to take stock of where we are at this point in our

lives, and attempt to improve and augment our lives in such a way that will render positive results. Goals need not be lofty ones, but small, positive changes will lead to more. Pirkei Avot (Ethics of our Fathers) 4:2 states, "מצווה גוררת מצווה" (one good deed will bring another good deed).

I have often heard the shofar compared to an alarm clock. Its haunting reverberation is meant to wake us from our slumber. It is

referenced many times throughout the Tanach. The shofar, the simple ram's horn, is reminiscent of the binding of Isaac, and Abraham's complete and utter faith in G-d who instructed Abraham to sacrifice his son. It was an instrument to announce the new month, the start of wars, and used in the Temple in Jerusalem.

The shofar, along with apples and honey, round challahs and pomegranates, are symbols of the possibilities that the new year may bring. We Jews believe that it's not an

issue of "que sera sera," and that whatever will be, will be, but our actions have a role to play in shaping whatever happens in 5774.

Think about the small things that you can do to engage in *tikkun olam* (repairing

the world). Offer a seat to a pregnant woman on the subway, hold a door open, gossip less and smile more. You are the key to a better tomorrow.

So, as we listen to the blasts of the shofar, may the 5774 that we create be one of happiness, friendship, good times and laughter.
